A REPORT FROM YOUR FOOD PANTRY

The numbers are in for the Year 2017 regarding the St. Mark's Food Pantry. Those who work in the Pantry and assist our visitors receive bags of food wanted you to know how successful we were.

First, you gave \$1,078.35 in the "Noisy Offering" the last Sunday of each month in 2017. And you donated 1,203 pounds of food! With your money offerings we were able to purchase additional food items from the San Antonio Food Bank and from stores in the local community.

With the food and money you provided, we served the following numbers of people throughout 2017:

Number of families served: 542

Number of individuals: 712 Children, age 0-5: 78 Number of first-time requests: 92 Elderly, age 60+: 163

Our Food Pantry is considered an "Emergency Pantry," where our limited resources are shared with our neighbors to assist them for a few days while they make plans to become responsible to meet their own basic needs. Ninety-two of the 542 families requesting food (17%) came to St. Mark's for the first time asking for assistance. Yes, some people come every month to ask for food, but we are pleased that such a large number of visitors in 2017 came for the first time. And 241 people, or 34% of all who requested food, were in the most vulnerable age groups of 0-5 years and over age 60.

Thank you for your compassion and generosity. Please pray that we can continue to multiply the food we are given to share.

With Your Help The United Methodist Church is Making a Difference FROM AN ORPHANAGE AND SCHOOL TO A DEPOT DISPENSING RELIEF SUPPLIES ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Sager Brown, now home to the <u>UMCOR</u> Relief-Supply Depot, celebrated 150 years of service to Baldwin, Louisiana, and the world in September. UMCOR Sager Brown's history began in 1867 when the site was established as an orphanage and school for African-American youth left homeless by the Civil War. It was launched by members of one of United Methodist Women's predecessor organizations. Through many years of financial ups and downs, Sager Brown persevered as a school. However, in 1978, the school closed its doors, and the property remained vacant for fourteen years.

In 1992, Hurricane Andrew tore through Louisiana and the Gulf Coast region. Despite the severe damage to surrounding communities, the Sager Brown facilities and grounds survived intact. In response to the disaster, UMCOR used the location as a distribution center to assist local communities affected by the hurricane. As a result, a partnership formed between the two institutions. UMCOR decided to maintain the campus as a location to assemble and deploy relief supplies to the world, and the depot was organized in 1996.

At UMCOR Sager Brown, volunteers can put their faith into action by participating in the many outreach programs provided, including the opportunity for volunteers to assemble relief supply kits that reach vulnerable communities around the world. Equipped to house individuals and teams, the Sager Brown campus welcomes short-term mission trips for United Methodists and people of other faith traditions.

Last year, 4,000 volunteers served at both UMCOR depot locations, UMCOR Sager Brown and UMCOR West Depot in Salt Lake City, Utah. Between the two locations, volunteers gave 40,500 hours of their time, completing 119 community projects. Volunteer service enables this outreach ministry to have a tremendous impact on the world. In 2016, Sager Brown distributed \$6,023,591 in relief supplies domestically and abroad.

1 Corinthians 15 English Standard Version The Resurrection of Christ

¹Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, ² and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. ³ For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁵ and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶ Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷ Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ℰ Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me.

We have no doubts about the resurrection of Jesus. We believe it. That is how we became Christian. That he died, was buried and was raised on the third day, is the foundation on which our faith stands. The Christian faith rests on the fact of Jesus' resurrection.

Jesus really died. That is the first point Paul is trying to establish. If Jesus was raised from the dead, he must first have died. Christ died for our sins. To repair the spiritual damage caused by sins.

The burial of Jesus' body is a confirmation of his death. ⁴ that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day <u>in accordance with the Scriptures</u>. This truth is confirmed by Old Testament prophecies; (Psalm 16:10; Isaiah 53:10; Hosea 6:2).

Every Sunday is a celebration of Jesus resurrection. I invite all of you to come and celebrate not only this coming Easter Sunday on April 1, but every Sunday as a celebration that He is Alive! **Our Lord Savior Jesus Christ is Alive!** We believe!

Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

Colorectal cancer is the second leading cancer killer in the United States

Colorectal cancer usually starts from polyps in the colon or rectum. **Precancerous** polyps and early stage colorectal cancer don't always cause symptoms! If you are 50 or older, getting a colorectal cancer screening test could save your life

Types of screenings

Colonoscopy: Recommended every 10 years

High-Sensitivity Fecal Occult Blood Test: You receive a test from your doctor and collect

Recommended once a year

Your risk for colorectal cancer may be higher than average if:

the stool specimen at home and return test to your doctor or a lab.

- You or a close relative had colorectal polyps or colorectal cancer
- · You have inflammatory bowel disease
- You have a genetic syndrome such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP) or hereditary nonpolyposis colorectal cancer
- You have type 2 diabetes


Colon Cancer (Colorectal Cancer)

Signs & Symptons: Colorectal cancer may not cause any symptoms in early stages. The following signs should raise suspicion * Change in bowel habits: Diarrhea or constipation or a change in the consistency of stool.

Narrow, pencil-thin stools.

Rectal bleed or blood in stool. Persistent


- abdominal discomfort such as gas, pain or cramps.
- Feeling bowel does not empty completely.
 Unexplained weight loss. Constant fatigue.
- Stage I: Cells that line the colon are very active, constantly dividing and creating buds, known as polyps. Most polyps are small, benign growth that eventually stop growing.




Stage II: A tiny percentage of these polyps keep growing, sometimes for ten years or more. Various genetic mutations can transform them into cancerous tumors.

Stage III: As these tumors grow larger, they gather more mutations deeper and deeper into the muscle wall that surrounds the colon.

Stage IV: Once the cancer invades the blood and lymph systems, malignant cells can break off and spread to other organs, such as the liver. lungs and stomach

Comments:

February receipts were \$339 higher than budgeted, while \$1,608 lower than February 2017. Year-to-Date receipts are \$1,383 higher than budgeted, while trailing 2017 by \$6,369.

February operating expenses were \$3,886 lower than budgeted and \$1,448 lower than February 2017. Lower Mission Giving and Trustee expenses resulted in the favorable spending. Year-to-Date expenses were lower by \$8,631 as a result of lower Mission Giving payments, Pastor compensation, and Council on Ministries expenses. Versus 2017, February expenses were favorable \$1,448 for the momth and \$1,774 Year-to-Date.

Other income in February was \$1,323, \$993 lower than budgeted. Year-to-Date Other Income is favorable \$1,165.

Our operating cash balance on February 28, 2018 was \$36,401.

While 2018 is off to what appears to be a good start versus budget, it's important to realize that in 2018 we are budgeting a \$77,000 shortfall.

The Finance Committee asks you to review your level of support to St. Mark's, and ask that you keep St Mark's in your prayers.
