APPORTIONMENT DOLLARS HELP PRESERVE CHURCH'S RICH HISTORY

Your support of the <u>General Administration Fund</u> apportionment allows them to fulfill its mission in maintaining historical records of the church's rich history. One of the ways they do this is preserving stories of Methodist missionaries. Here is one of their stories from the archives:

Gertrude M. Feely was a Methodist Episcopal Church, South, missionary in Japan. She served under the guidance of the Women's Division of the MECS and after 1940 of the Methodist Church. Feely received her B.S. from the University of Missouri in 1927. She earned an M.A. from Scarritt College in Tennessee in 1930 and a Ph. D. in education from Columbia University in 1950.

Feely was a missionary for more than forty years, and worked in several Japanese cities. From 1931 to 1933, she taught English and language study at the Kure Naval Station and at Kobe. While in Oita from 1933 to 1941, Feely was involved with youth work and taught English.

In 1941, she went to the Philippines and during the Second World War was interned by the Japanese. She spent time in the Santo Tomas and Los Banos Camps and stayed with a group of Methodist missionaries at Harris Memorial Training School for some time before she was finally interned in Los Banos. She served as an interpreter for two and a half years of the war.

Upon her liberation on February 23, 1945, Feely was furloughed to the United States, where she remained until 1949. Feely returned to Japan later in 1949 and became the director of the Kobe Christian Youth Center, which opened in 1953. She continued to teach, working at the Night School, at the Palmore Institute and at Seiwa Junior College, where she was an instructor in the Old Testament. In 1954, Feely was ordained by the Church of Japan.

The collection has a variety of information about her experience as a missionary and as a person during the Second World War. There is a touching meditation that she wrote on her 36th (1939) birthday describing the challenges, both personal and emotional, involved in becoming a missionary. There are also camp newsletters produced by the internees. The last newsletter leads off with the following: "After 37 long months we celebrate our first day of freedom today with the final departure of the Japanese from the City of Manila, and await with bounding hearts our own, our friends, our allies." Feely also kept a diary during her interment. The diary was in the form of letters to a friend in Manila. She also kept a notebook which tracked conditions in the camp.


In these documents we see the humanity of the individual. She returned to Japan after the war and helped the people there re-build their lives and their church. She retired in 1972.

From Rev. Soto's Desk



Lent begins this year on Wednesday, February 14, with dust and ashes. On this journey of 40 days we acknowledge our human limitations and we are reminded that we are dust and to dust we will return. It is a time of change, renewal and spiritual growth.

In John 12:24, Jesus prepares his disciples for the great law of life. ²⁴ Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds."

"Unless a kernel of wheat **falls** to the **ground** and **dies**." A grain of wheat contains in itself the germs of life. It remains only a single seed unless it falls to the ground and dies. That corn which dies in the earth through the bursting forth of the living germ, in this way of death, produces much fruit. Releasing the inner life-power which the husk held captive before.

In this Season of Lent, may the Holy Spirit lead us into a journey of 40 days of self-denial for our spiritual growth and renewal as people of God, and as a church in a community that more than ever needs to see that "living germ" inside of us, bursting forth. We are no longer held captive, we have been set free by Him.

January is National Glaucoma Awareness Month



Glaucoma is the leading cause of irreversible blindness.

As much as 40% of vision can be lost without a person noticing.

Although the most common forms primarily affect the middle-aged and the elderly, glaucoma can affect people of all ages.

Vision loss is caused by damage to the optic nerve. It usually happens when fluid builds up in the front part of your eye. That extra fluid increases the pressure in your eye, damaging the optic nerve.

The most common type happens gradually, where the eye does not drain fluid as well as it should (like a clogged drain). As a result, eye pressure builds and starts to damage the optic nerve. This type of glaucoma is painless and causes no vision changes at first.

Another type of Glaucoma can sometimes be a cause for a visit to the emergency room. When the drainage angle gets completely blocked, eye pressure rises very quickly. This is called an acute attack. You should call your ophthalmologist right away or you might go blind.

Here are the signs of an acute angle-closure glaucoma attack:

- o Your vision is suddenly blurry
- o You have severe eye pain
- o You have a headache
- o You feel sick to your stomach (nausea)
- o You throw up (vomit)
- o You see rainbow-colored rings or halos around lights

There is no cure for glaucoma—yet. However, medication or surgery can slow or prevent further vision loss.

Early detection is vital to stopping the progress of the disease!

Project Transformation is a ministry within the United Methodist church. Their mission is to engage young adults in purposeful leadership and ministry, support children in holistic development, and connect churches with communities.

The ministry provides an opportunity for young adults to experience leading high quality programs working with children and youth in low income communities. The programs focus on enriching the children's minds, bodies, and spirits, however, their emphasis is in improving the literacy of the children. The ministry improves the opportunities of the children while allowing the young adults to explore their potential service in the clergy.

Project Transformation is already working in San Antonio. College age adults have been recruited from across the country and they have been working as summer programs with host churches within our conference since 2015. The college interns live together in intentional Christian community. One of the biggest struggles has been securing adequate housing for the young adults during the time that they are here in San Antonio.

St. Marks has been recommended by our district superintendent as a possible solution for their housing needs. Lovely Lane has been under-used for several years since the day care was closed. We now have the opportunity to put it to good use again. The directors of Project Transformation would like to upgrade and remodel Lovely Lane into a building where the young adults could live

during their stay in San Antonio. Some of the classrooms would be repurposed as dormitory rooms and the restrooms would remodeled to include showers and other amenities for them. The plans are just now being discussed so we don't know all of the changes that would be required. During the summer programs there would be 30 or more young adults that would go to their assigned churches each day and return to Lovely Lane in the afternoon. One day each week they would meet as a community in the Sanctuary for a worship service. Volunteers from local churches provide them with meals each evening. There would be at least 2, more mature, adults that would act as resident hosts to stay in Lovely Lane the year round. time to time traveling clergy, From missionaries on leave, or others in San Antonio may also take advantage of a night's lodging on St. Mark's campus.

Can we afford it? St. Marks has already made the investment in a wonderful building that we are no longer using to its potential. Project Transformation will raise the funds to do the remodeling and upgrading of Lovely Lane. They will reimburse St. Marks for the additional utility expenses and assume the cost of future maintenance. The cost to St. Marks is that we will have to share the use of Lovely Lane with groups of young adults who could potentially be our future clergy. When we can make this happen it will guarantee that the property at 1902 Vance Jackson will remain a United Methodist presence in the Dellview Neighborhood.

The goal is to complete the remodel for the young adults to begin living here in the summer of 2019, but many details still need to be worked out.

Comments:

2017 Total receipts were \$9,025 higher than budgeted, while \$14,878 Lower than 2016. A larger than expected Christmas contributions resulted in our exceeding budget. A large Christmas contribution from one family made the difference.

Total year operating expenses were \$19,457 lower than budgeted and \$9,839 lower than 2016. Lower Lay personnel compensation coupled with lower Trustee expense resulted in being favorable to the budget and 2016.

December had a cash inflow of \$23,599 and for the year a cash inflow of \$34,634. In 2017 we had other contributions of \$91,192 (primarily the result of being the recipients of insurance policies left to the church).

While the year looks quite impressive, it's important to remember that without the Other Income, we would have had a cash outflow of approximately \$25,000. We can't expect similar events this year.

The Finance Committee asks you to review your level of support to St. Mark's, and ask that you keep St Mark's in your prayers.
