SCHOLARSHIP SUPPORTS FUTURE UNITED METHODIST PASTOR

"I was anti-Christian growing up just because that's the kind of the attitude that my dad always had. I didn't like Christians because everything that was taught to me about them was from people who weren't Christians. No one in my family went to church before I started going in 9th grade," recalls Tyler Hungate. But he continued to attend the 4:12 youth group at Marion UMC in Marion, lowa with his friends every Wednesday night, but only as a way to appease them.

"I wasn't a Christian; going on Wednesday night became my routine. I would go and hang out on Wednesday nights but I never really paid attention to the sermons or applied anything that I learned at the church to my life," explained Hungate.

As time went on the pastor invited Hungate to summer camp. Hungate did not want to attend but felt obligated to participate because the church paid the camp fees for him to attend. During the summer camp, Hungate accepted Christ as his savior. "This experience changed my life completely," says Hungate. "Many of my most meaningful relationships come from church and they continue to be a support system for myself and my family. "There were times when our family struggled financially. My father

struggled at times with his health and my brother battles depression, Marion UMC was a safe place during the difficult times," said Hungate. Since I accepted Christ my sister and mother have followed suit. My mom is now the nursery director at our church."

As Hungate prepared to attend college, his pastor recommended that he apply for the United Methodist Student Day Sunday Gift of Hope scholarship. "The scholarship helped relieve a lot of the financial stress on my life as I entered college," remarked Hungate. "After I finish my studies at the University of Iowa, I plan to attend seminary to pursue my goal of becoming a United Methodist pastor. In June 2020 Hungate became Youth Pastor at Center Point UMC in Center Point IA. He has a passion for leading students to accept Jesus and to become disciples.

"I'm trying to live like Christ on a college campus which can be difficult due to the culture on most college campuses. I plan to make my faith the central pillar of my life and career as I help others to grow in Christ," Hungate said.

One of six churchwide Special Sundays with offerings of The UMC, United Methodist Student Day calls the church to support students as they prepare for life in uniting faith with knowledge. The special offering provides scholarships for qualified United Methodist applicants. Umcqiving.org


Thank you for your financial support in 2020. We anticipate 2021 to be a difficult year financially and we ask you to support St. Mark's as much as possible.

Overcoming The Trials

²Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, ³because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. ⁴Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. ⁵If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. **James 1:2-5 NIV**

This past year 2020 we have experienced one of the most difficult years in human history, and it seems that this new year 2021 is not going to be much different. The trials that we have experienced are not surprising, since we know that Scripture warns us of them, but also gives us the direction on how to overcome them and obtain victory.

This leads me to ask: What have we learned from 2020 that will help us get through 2021?

The apostle James begins by saying about the trials, " ²Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds" The first thing to make clear is that trials will continue and will not stop. Therefore, our eyes should not be on the trials we face, but on the result. Nor does it mean that we do not need to pay attention to what is happening, because as in all tests, we can fail. Now when the apostle mentions *pure joy*, he is talking about our emotional and spiritual state.

Therefore, the emotional and spiritual state is directly affected no matter how much faith you and I have, but for those of us who have fully trusted God, trials become an opportunity to grow in character and give us strength to move forward in life.

The apostle James also announces the result of the test given to us when he says: "³because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance." Then he adds: "⁴And perseverance must bring the work to a successful conclusion, so that they may be perfect and whole, lacking nothing." Beloved, the endurance with hope and the endurance that we acquire through trial makes us mature in character without missing anything. This past year has strengthened us because we have remained steadfast in our faith. And for those who are still processing the situation we are experiencing, the apostle advises us that, "⁵If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you." This is advice that we must take into consideration, as there are many people who do not understand why humanity is being tested. Tests are necessary in people's lives. There is no one who has reached the top without proof. There is no way to recognize the blessing without experiencing a moment of suffering.

Resistance is not a consequence of circumstances, but is a consequence of trust in God, no matter what is happening around us. What is happening around us may change, but God never changes, just as our faith grows with trials.

Trials do not take us away from God, on the contrary, they bring us closer to God as our faith strengthened. The year 2021 will be full of trials, but those of us who have faith in the Lord will not be defeated because we trust in His promise.

I have told you all this so that you may have peace in me. Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world." John 16:33 NLT

Pruebas: Como Poder Sobrellevarlas

Este pasado año 2020 hemos experimentado uno de los años más difíciles en la historia humana, y parece ser que este nuevo año 2021 no va a ser muy diferente. Las pruebas que hemos pasado no son de extrañar, ya que sabemos que la Escritura nos advierte de ellas, pero también nos da la dirección en como poder sobrellevarlas y obtener la victoria.

Esto me lleva a preguntar: ¿Que hemos aprendido de este año 2020 que nos ayudará a sobrellevar el 2021?

El apóstol Santiago comienza diciendo acerca de las pruebas, "2 Hermanos míos, considérense muy dichosos cuando tengan que enfrentarse con diversas pruebas" Lo primero que hay que dejar claro, es que las pruebas continuarán y no se detendrán. Por lo tanto, nuestros ojos no deben de estar puestos en la prueba, sino en el resultado. Tampoco significa que no prestemos atención a lo que está sucediendo, porque como en toda prueba podemos reprobar. Ahora, cuando el apóstol menciona de considerarnos dichosos, nos está hablando de nuestro estado emocional y espiritual.

Por lo tanto, el estado emocional y espiritual es afectado directamente no importando cuanta fe usted y yo tengamos, pero para los que hemos confiado en Dios plenamente las pruebas se convierten en una oportunidad para crecer en carácter y firmeza para seguir adelante en la vida.

También el apóstol Santiago nos anuncia el resultado de la prueba, dice: 3 pues ya saben que la prueba de su fe produce constancia. Luego dice: 4 Y la constancia debe llevar a feliz término la obra, para que sean perfectos e íntegros, sin que les falte nada. Amados, el aguante con esperanza y la resistencia que adquirimos a través de la prueba hace que maduremos en carácter sin que nada nos falte. Este año que pasó, nos ha fortalecido porque hemos permanecido firme en nuestra fe. Y para aquellos que todavía estan procesando la situación que estamos viviendo, el apóstol nos aconseja que, 5 Si a alguno de ustedes le falta sabiduría, pídasela a Dios, y él se la dará, pues Dios da a todos generosamente sin menospreciar a nadie. Este es un consejo que tenemos que tomar a consideración, ya que hay muchas personas que no entienden porque está a prueba la humanidad. Las pruebas son necesarias en la vida de las personas. No hay nadie que haya llegado a la cima sin pruebas. No hay manera de reconocer la bendición sin experimentar un momento de sufrimiento.

La resistencia no es consecuencia de las circunstancias, sino es consecuencia de la confianza en Dios, no importando lo que está sucediendo a nuestro alrededor. Lo que está pasando a nuestro alrededor puede cambiar, pero Dios nunca cambia, así como nuestra fe va en crecimiento con las pruebas.

Las pruebas no nos alejan de Dios, todo lo contrario, nos acercan más a Dios y nuestra fe se fortalece aún más. El año 2021 estará lleno de pruebas, pero los que tenemos la fe puesta en el Señor no seremos derrotados, porque confiamos en Su promesa.

COVID-19 Vaccine Q&A

When we embody God's healing to others, we join in God's healing activity. The Scriptures call us to the possibility of transforming the health of people or communities. Providing straightforward answers to common questions about COVID-19 vaccines in order to encourage people to receive a vaccine is one practical way to do this.

Q. How were the vaccines developed so fast?

A. The first vaccines were "messenger RNA," or mRNA vaccines. These used research that had been in process for many years for other viruses. With extra funding and focused research by scientists to solve the final steps, they went into trials quickly. Since the virus was prevalent, many infected people were available to study in trials and provide the needed data quickly. (Source: CDC, NIH)

Q. Is this vaccine still considered experimental?

A. No. It is offered under the FDA's "emergency use authorization" to facilitate availability during a public health crisis. It is not experimental because it has cleared all safety standards, which have not been lowered in any way for this vaccine. (Source: Mayo, FDA, CDC, New England Journal of Medicine)

Q. Do I need a vaccine if I already had COVID-19?

A. Yes. About 10 percent who recover from COVID-19 have weak antibodies that wear off, so they may be reinfected. We don't know who will be in this 10 percent, so the guideline is for everyone to receive the vaccine. (Source: biorxiv.org)

Q. What happens if I only get one dose?

A. After about two weeks, your immunity to COVID-19 will reach about 50 percent. Without a second dose, it will remain at that level rather than go up to 95 percent. (Source: Pfizer data)

Q. How long does it take for me to be immune to COVID-19?

A. After about two weeks, your immunity to COVID-19 will reach about 50 percent. Then after another 21 or 28 days you will get a second dose. Two weeks after the second dose is when you reach 95 percent immunity. So plan on a process of five to six weeks. (Source: Pfizer data)

Q. If I get vaccinated, why do I still need to wear a mask and social distance?

A. It takes a few weeks for your body to build up protection. Also, we do not know if vaccines keep you from getting infected (we hope so!) or just keep you from getting sick if you are infected and you might still infect others who are not vaccinated (we hope not). This is still under study. (Source: Pfizer and Moderna trial data)

Q. Can I still get COVID-19 if I get the vaccine?

A. Yes. The vaccines available now are about 95 percent effective if you receive both doses. That's not 100 percent, so that means some vaccinated people might still get sick if infected. However, the vaccine will reduce the risk of severe symptoms or hospitalization. (Source: CDC, Mayo)

Q. Will the vaccines protect against new variants?

A. Yes. The new variants that turned up in the UK (B.1.1.7) and South Africa (501.V2) are similar enough that if you are vaccinated, your body will recognize them and respond to fight them. (Source: Pfizer data)
